Our worship series for Lent is titled: "Holy Vessels; A Lenten Season of Recovery"

Each of us is created as a precious and holy vessel of embodied love. We have been through a harrowing time since last Lent that has shattered our sense of wholeness-body, mind, and spirit-like a glass vessel fractured into pieces. In this Lenten "season of recovery" for our physical, communal, mental, intellectual, and environmental health, we will explore the healing narratives of Jesus that tell of divine solidarity with human suffering and remind us that we can begin a journey toward making something beautiful from that which is seemingly broken. Beach glass offers us a multifaceted symbol of this transformative process.

As we look to recover together during this season, we will begin with our Ash Wednesday Service.

"CAUGHT IN THE UNDER TOW"

35 years ago, on the Island of Oahu I was enjoying a great day at the beach with my new bride.

We had already been out in the big waves; but when I desired to go back one more time, Linda declined. She has always been smarter. I went back out into the surging waves and surf and was enjoying some body surfing and then began my way back towards the beach. My timing was certainly off as a big wave smacked me down, slammed me onto the sand and then sucked me along for a bit. She has pictures of me crawling out of the waves looking anything but triumphant. With a mild concussion and damaged pride, I discovered that I had been a victim of the dreaded under tow.

The under tow is a powerful current below the surface of the waves that has the strength to pull a person out to sea against one's will. Frantically swimming to fight only exhausts the victim and usually leads to drowning. I was lucky that day.

Below the surface of our everyday lives is a powerful current that seeks to pull us out to a sea of uncertainty, fear, anxiety, frustration, anger and despair. It is a current powered by multiple sources; a killer virus, a plague of systemic racism, a violent surge of ignorant conservatism and a fueled misconception that God is on one particular side and not another. The strength of this under tow is formidable and makes us flail and flounder helplessly in unknown waters or waters that we are experiencing differently now that our faith has given us the ability to swim.

Entering 2021 with not only the same pandemic and rising death toll but also additional violence caused by an ideology of white supremacy and entitlement has been overwhelming for all of us. So, what do we do now and what do we do next?

DON'T GET CAUGHT IN THE UNDER TOW: In other words, have faith and keep believing. As followers of Jesus we must never fall into the trap of hopelessness. Even as Jesus was on the cross, he saw a bright future because of his sacrifice and the disciples who would carry out the mission of the church and share God's love.

SURROUND YOURSELF WITH GOOD SWIMMERS: We all feel safer in dangerous waters when we are wearing a life preserver and in the company of life guards. We must be willing to separate ourselves from negativity and from negative persons. A negative person does not have to be someone who disagrees with us, it is simply a person who attaches to the words, actions, and behaviors that drives a wedge between ourselves and God.

KEEP MOVING TOWARD THE BEACH: Gravitate toward God, the church and others of faith. You may be familiar with the old hymn, "Keep Your Eyes Upon Jesus." This is exactly what we need to do. We must focus on the reality of His presence even when we are pulled under water. Hope breeds eternal when we keep our sights on the one who can save us.

We do not have the luxury to wait until the pandemic is over, until the violence ends, the injustice stops, until we can gather in larger groups. We must navigate the challenging waters with faith, hope and love. "And the greatest of these is love." 1 Corinthians 13:13

In 1968, General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR) was formed to hold the newly formed United Methodist Church accountable in its commitment to reject the sin of racism in every aspect of the life of the church.

GCORR will not rest in its work of challenging and equipping the church to complete its unfinished agenda of dismantling racial discrimination. We continue to do this by championing diversity, equity and inclusion; developing interculturally competent leaders; and catalyzing authentic community.

While racism remains our primary focus, our perspective and partnerships reflect a broader context, which includes poverty, nationalism, tribal conflicts, gender discrimination, homophobia, disability and generational bias—because we know all forms of oppression are connected, and they cannot be dismantled in isolation.

Black History Month is an opportune time to discover or rediscover aspects of U.S. history often ignored or obscured by "official" educational systems, legalized policies and practices, and even ecclesial narratives. By focusing on the testimonies, accounts, and realities of Black Americans, we open ourselves to a more accurate account of how the United States was formed, survived, and thrived despite our sinful reliance upon legally and culturally enforced slave labor of those born in and of Africa.

Black History Month gives all of us the chance to interrogate the narratives taught by our schools, our legal systems, and, yes, even our churches. By doing so, we get a better sense of who we are, who we desire to be, and what we're willing to lay down and pick up for our desire to become reality.

I am confident, that as people of faith called United Methodists, that we will courageously move forward with the hard conversations that reveal both our vulnerability, ignorance and limitations to understanding until we listen to one another."

Celebrating Black History Month with Kids and Families



Black History Month Book Discussion:



As most everyone knows, February is Black history month. The question I asked myself, is what does that mean to me? History in general, was never "MY thing," however; my deceased husband Rick always reminded me that history was extremely important because if people didn't learn from history, we would continue to make the same mistakes. This past year we watched over and over how people of color were mistreated and killed as they have been for many years based on the color of their skin. History was repeating itself in the most awful way.



I will continue to pray as I have been that we learn from Black History. Many great Americans and Humanitarians have been black, and we must remember that people of color are God's children. God commands us to love his children as he does, without exception!

1 John 4:7-8, "⁷ Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love."

I am aware of the difficulties of having honest conversations about tough issues. But, as people of faith, this should not prevent us from trying.



As we continue on in the Covid-19 pandemic, we are aware that there are individuals within our church that have been extremely isolated throughout these past ten months. Our pastoral staff has remained in communication with these individuals and the resounding need that all have expressed desire for is continued communication (phone calls, emails, letters, pictures, etc.). We would love to put together a pen pal program in which individuals and families could be matched with a more isolated individual to provide this need. The pen pal would receive all the necessary items (envelopes, stamps, address labels) to correspond with their pal. Correspondence could be as simple as a picture that your child has drawn recently. We are looking to begin this program in March and continue through the end of May. 


The Holy Spirit's presence within the life of our congregation has been wonderfully apparent this past year throughout the pandemic. The finance team is thankful for the faithful stewardship of everyone who continued to give to the church online, in person at times, and even dropping off contributions to the church office. Year-to-date operating giving was 90% of the operating budget goal. Year-to-date operating spending was held in line with giving. We are not spending more than we receive. In addition, we were able to pay down the mortgage principal to approximately \$162,000. While completely extinguishing the debt is in sight, it will take us nearly 3 years to pay it off at the current rate of giving to the mortgage fund. Special contributions to help extinguish the remaining debt can be made online or marked mortgage paydown. Because of your generosity, we can continue to grow as a community of faith where Christ is fully known, wholly loved, and genuinely served. Thank you!



Thank you to the NUMC church family for your generosity in supporting the Christmas Gift Mission. We were able to help provide toys and clothing items to 78 children.
